THE Civil Aviation Department has been given the green light to spend more than \$8.5 million to strengthen the Airport Fire Contingent's equipment.

The amount will be used to buy a replacement from

to buy a replacement foam tender which will be deployed at the new Chek Lap Kok airport after the Kai Tak facility is closed by 1997.

At present, the contingent is equipped with three foam tenders, one of which was purchased in 1979 and the remaining two in 1981.

Department officials explained that the service condition of the oldest one had been deteriorating.

In order to satisfy the minimum safety requirements of the International

Civil Aviation Organisa-

tion, it needs to be replaced in 1991-92," they said. Their request for addi-tional funds for a replace-ment foam tender was approved by the Legislative Council's Finance Committee earlier this month.
