'Appeal' \trip successful

Three representatives of the Wanderers' Association yesterday described their "appeal" trip to Britain as "successful."

The three-member group left for Britain on January 16 to appeal for international help to resettle illegal immigrants from China.

The association's chairman, Mr Chow Hing-chuen, told reporters at Kai Tak that the trip was worthwhile.
