Activists in last-ditch bid to save labour laws

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Pro-democracy groups and unionists are making lastditch efforts to oppose the suspension of five labour

Two groups of Democrats will stage sit-ins outside MTR stations this afternoon following the start of a 48hour sit-in by colleagues at Kwun Tong MTR station

yesterday.

The Legislative Provisions (Suspension of Operation) Bill 1997 is expected to be passed at a sitting of the Provisional Legislative Council tomorrow. But members will attempt to allow a bill increasing compensation for occupational deafness to take effect.

Hunger striker and unionist Leung Yiu-chung said he was hopeful the deafness law would be passed, but added the other four labour laws were as important. He said he would continue his hunger strike until tomorrow.

A group of democrats led by ousted legislator Fred Li Wah-ming yesterday began a 48-hour sit-in outside Kwun

Tong MTR station. One of the petitioners, provisional urban councillor Francis Tang Chi-ho, said he thought the laws would be frozen, but believed it was worthwhile to organise a sig-

nature campaign. "This is a good chance for us to educate the public, especially workers, about labour rights. Many people have been influenced [by the claim] the bills were passed in a rush, so we can explain to them what exactly is happening now.'

The signatures will be presented to the Chief Executive's Office tomorrow and a rally will be staged.
