FURTHER to "Glenealy Parent's" letter (S.C.M. Post, October 12), I would like to add my observations of a Hongkong education to his.

My daughter entered Glenealy at the age of six years and was subsequently educated there and at KGV until at the age of 18 she entered university in England.

During our past three long leaves which varied from a period of five months to seven months each, she never at any

months each, she never at any time attended school, as all these leaves were spent outside the United Kingdom.

Nevertheless in spite of this seemingly "patchy" education she obtained eight "O" levels with high grade passes, followed this with good "A" level results and at the control of the contr level results and at the age of 20 graduated with a B A Hons degree from university.

Of course during these years as parents we have had to pay education expenses which we probably would not have incurred had we been resident in UK and her education taken there.

However, the result now is a confident young woman who has travelled extensively; who is capable at interesting conversation on many subjects, conversation on many subjects, and, most important, who is completely free from any form of racial prejudice. In this parent's eyes, a credit to her Hongkong education.
