80 groups to meet on teachers' row

MORE 80 than community organisations will meet on Sunday to map out future moves in dealing with the deplcyment of redundant Government schools primary teachers.

The Government Non-graduate ers' Union School Teachers' delivered an ultimatum to the Government two weeks ago demanding direct negotiations.

The inecting at Hilton Hotel on Sunday coincides with the deadline the union has laid down and the teachers expect extensive union actions will be drawn un. up.

A spokesman for the union said there were minor union actions during the months following the Government's announcement ir July of the deployment programme.

"But the matter seems to have been forgotten as the actions evidently have

to have been forgotten as the actions evidently have not shaken up the Government," he said.

The Government announced in July that there will be 1,100 redundant teachers in Government primary schools by 1980.

The 80 community organisation attending the Sunday's meeting will include civil servant associations, educations associations, education societies, kaifong association and other public services.
