\$1m aid for civic eduction

THE Government has allocating over \$1 million to launch intensive publicity campaigns on civic educa-

The chairman of the Committee on the Promo-tion of Civic Education, Mrs Rita Fan, said yesterday \$1.28 million - \$530,000 more than last year - had been allocated to engender a better sense of civic-minded-

ness in Hongkong.
A total of \$700,000 will be spent on a publicity package which includes a large-scale variety show, television pro-

grams.

Opponents of direct elec-tions have accused Hong-kong people of lacking civic awareness, saying they are not mature enough for so-phisticated politics or drastic changes.

Mrs Fan said civic awareness should be promoted regardless of the political issues being debated. She said the committee had encouraged people to voice their opin-ions on all social affairs, including the current political review.

The committee was formed last year with mem-bers from several Govern-

ment departments.

The extra money is ex-pected to be used to expand the committee's civic education resource room into a full-scale centre to better serve the community.

The committee's community participation scheme would also be reinforced with an increase of funding and 23 projects would be completed during the year.
