WIDESPREAD concern surfaced yesterday about the availability of adequate public services during and after the multi-billion dollar redevelopment plan for Tze Wan Shan Estate.

The redevelopment, which is estimated to cost about \$3 billion, will be the largest under the Housing Authority's comprehensive redevelopment programme.
