350 workers protest at unreasonable' dismissal

SOME 350 workers of Century Garment Factory and Harvest Textile Factory, who were dismissed by their new receiver yesterday, are stag-ing a sit-in protest at the factory until they get their

They claimed that they were dismissed "unreasonably" and were totally unprepared for the notices of dismissed

missal.

A representative of the workers, Miss Winnie Chan, who was also the factory general manager, said that on January 11, the bank creditor had informed her boss. Mr Victor Ho, that factory's \$15 million overdraft facility was too high. Mr Ho immediately flew

to the United States to raise funds and, on Friday, had sent a US\$2 million letter of credit to the bank.

The Century Garment Factory has been established ractory has been established 12 years and employed more than 250 workers. The Har-vest Textile Factory was established in 1978 and had 100 workers.

Miss Chan said em-ployees worked overetime almost daily to keep up with

almost daily to keep up with overseas orders.

"According to our monthly turnover of \$10 million, and monthly profit of \$1 million, we had enough money for the debts," Miss Chan said.

been denied seven days com-pensation payment and, in-stead, would receive only three-and-a-half days pay. However Miss Chan said the bank creditor had in-formed workers that there might be no compensation. "They said they did not have enough money," she said. been denied seven days com-

Meanwhile, about 100 workers from the subsidiaries of the provisionally liquidated Good Year Estates yesterday petitioned the Umelco for help in their compensation claim.

The workers claimed that they had not received washes

they had not received waged and were entitled to more than \$6 million compensa-
