Action sought on high schools

A "ONE campus, two schools" system should be introduced to tackle the problems arising from the shortage of secondary schools in the northern New Territ-ories, district board members urged yester-

According to a report, more than 500 Form One students have to com-mute to other districts to attend school.

It was projected that this figure would rise to 3000 by 1995.

A concern group on the shortage of secondary schools in the New dary schools in the New Territories North, formed by several DB officers and organis-ations, said the Edu-cation Department should look into the problem immediately.

Tik Chi-yuen, District Board officer of the New Territories North, said

the Education Department had an "indisputable responsibility" to solve this problem.

He said the Education

He said the Education Department initially planned to finish build-ing four new secondary schools in the district this year, but only two had been completed so far. "There is not enough

supervision on the con-struction," Mr Tik said.

The concern group also criticised the construction of more pri-mary schools when al-ready there was a sur-plus of such schools in the district.

The group called for a "one campus, two schools" policy which would see a part of the Sheung-shui government school's campus allo-cated to students who could move out once the new buildings were completed in a year or two.
