Another old landmark to bite the dust

ANOTHER major historical Hongkong landmark is to

be razed to the ground.

The latest on the doomed list is the well-known Marine Department headquarters on Connaught Road near the Macao ferry

pier. Top Government officials are understood to have decided that the building be demolished and
