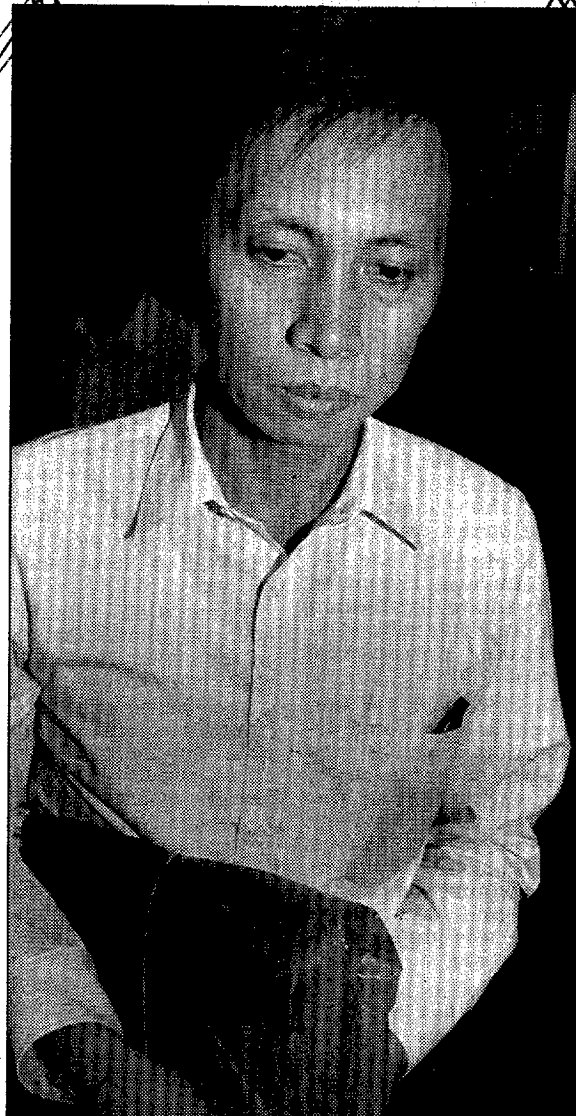

## Action group man arrested at school

A MEMBER of the radical April 5 Action Group was arrested by police yesterday but later released on \$5,000 bail pending further investigation.

Teacher Mr Hui Wai-yeung was taken from his primary school in Kwai Chung by five police officers.

Several people, including a police officer, were injured in a clash between policemen and members of the group on September 29 in Causeway Bay, outside the venue of a Chinese National Day cocktail party.

Four members of the group and a young British student have already been arrested and charged for their alleged involvement in the clash.

When Mr Hui left Wan Chai police station yesterday he was cheered by 10 group members waving a banner and chanting slogans denouncing the police action.

"Power is in the hands of the other side, fairness is on our side, and justice is in the heart of

the people," said a sullen Mr Hui.

Meanwhile, the April 5 Action Group has issued an open statement deploring the police raids on two television stations as comparable to the tactics used by Chinese authorities to purge pro-democracy activists.

After the June 4 massacre Chinese police used foreign news film as evidence to prosecute pro-democracy demonstrators.

Mr Chan Sze-keung, a spokesman for the group, said freedom of procession, demonstration and organisation were basic rights.

Mr Hui was questioned at Kwai Chung police station before being transferred to Wan Chai police station. He was not charged.

Mr Hui joined April 5 Action Group in May when the pro-democracy student movement in China was nearing its climax.

"I will not retreat as democracy is a long-run battle," he said when leaving the police station.
