## **Activists** detained. petitions removed

SHANGHAI customs authorities yesterday confiscated the signatures and letters carried by four local activists who went to the city to petition for the release of two Hongkong residents.

The four petitioners were interrogated by officials at Hongqiao Airport for more than an hour and were unable to contact the British

Consulate.

One of the four petitioners, Mr Vicky Li Lok, said last night two of them had been questioned by officials who intercepted them after they had passed through immigration control.

"After we passed through, a group of customs officers confronted us and we were taken into separate rooms," he said. Mr Leung Kai-bun was

detained alone by the officers for 35 minutes.
"They checked all our

luggage and took away all our petition material," Mr

Li said.

"We were given a receipt saying that they had been confiscated for investigation

We explained to them why we were there but they said they had not received any instructions concerning

our petition."

According to Mr Li, a customs officer who identi-fied himself as Mr Zeng said travellers were only allowed to carry their personal be-

longings.
"We will contact the customs department tomorrow morning and demand the return of the petitions."

The other two who went to Shanghai are Mr Wong Hung-shing and Father Franco Mella.

The petitions were collected from 30 local organisations and four district board members.

They demanded that mainland authorities release iu Yung-chin and Lau Shan-ching, both of whom were arrested on "counterrevolutionary charges".

Yiu was arrested in

Shanghai last June and Lau was sentenced to 10 years' jail in Guangzhou in 1983. Mr Li said: "When Mr Lau was tried, his family in Hongkong was not in-formed. We feared the same may happen to Yiu, who is just a 20-year-old student."

The four district board

members who signed the petitions were Mr Leung Yiuchung, Mr Tsui Pak-lam, the Reverend Fung Chi-wood and Mr Wai Hing-cheung. 17 april 1990
